INTRODUCTION

Wow! You finally made it! Seniors at last! Save the senioritis, though; there's plenty of work to do before graduation. This summer you will be expected to read the novel ***The Things They Carried*** (ISBN: 0767902890). Annotate the book—mark key passages, words, ideas, etc. To further enhance your reading experience, you will be completing two summer reading essays. They will be due during the first week of school and require more than a few hours to complete. I recommend that you begin work on them as soon as you finish the novel, so your ideas will be fresh; do not wait until the last few days.

You will also read ***How to Read Literature Like a Professor*** (ISBN 0-06-000942-X), a book that will ease the pressure of the AP exam if read carefully and applied to all the works we discuss this year. Please highlight important information as you read.

ESSAY

THE NOVEL:

Some of the themes developed in *The Things they Carried* are

- Fear of shame as a motivation
- Truth being subject to storytelling
- Things carried—physical and emotional
- Pressure caused by feeling the need to adhere to some cultural or community standard of duty, courage, or patriotism
- War and love

Pick two of these themes and write a 2 page (about 700 words) analysis for each. Also, find a critical source from the Gale Research Group and incorporate it into your analyses (you may need to use one for each analysis). Using the Brook Hill website, 1) click on *Academics* on the left; 2) on the new page, click on *middle/upper school home page*; 3) on the new page click on *Curriculum*; 4) on the new page click on *Gale Research Link*. Our password is “lonestar.” Search for at least one scholarly review or critical essay over ***The Things They Carried***. Print it (them) out to turn in with your analyses. Be sure to cite these appropriately in your paper and on your works cited page.

FORMAT
